

"GIVING THANKS"

On Thursday,, November 26st, the citizens of our nation will celebrate the Day of Thanksgiving. Historically, in 1621, the Plymouth colonists and Wampanoag Native Americans shared an autumn harvest feast that is acknowledged today as one of the first Thanksgiving celebrations in the American colonies. Others pinpoint the year 1637 as the true origin of Thanksgiving, owing to the fact Massachusetts colony governor John Winthrop declared a day of thanks-giving to celebrate a military victory.

Officially, on October 3, 1863, expressing gratitude for a pivotal Union Army victory at Gettysburg, President Abraham Lincoln announced that the nation would celebrate an official Thanksgiving holiday on November 26, 1863. Later, Thanksgiving Day was officially set on the 4th Thursday of November. Thus, the celebration of Thanksgiving Day has a long history in our nation.

For Christians, Thanksgiving is a day to express "our thanks" to Almighty God for the many blessings we receive from the bountiful hands of God. Now 2020, has not been a perfect year. For some people it has been a difficult year, but that doesn't mean we are not thankful. Some of you have been battered or hurt in one way or another this past year.

Disappointments at work, at home, or in the quietness of your own heart. Life may have not treated us kindly or gently, but even in the middle of difficulties and heartaches, we give thanks.

For all of us this has been an emotionally draining and incomprehensible year as we have had to deal with the coronavirus pandemic. But still we do give thanks. Why?

Because if we stop and think about our life, we come to realize that there are many things for which we ought to be thankful. As the Apostle Paul writes in the 4th chapter of Philippians: "Think about all you can praise God for and be glad about."

Some of us will say "thank you" to our parents for all the sacrifices which they have made on our behalf. All of us can say thank you to men and women through the ages who made amazing sacrifices that we might have our freedom and our Christian faith.

We are thankful to those who gave painstaking hours to science and medicine and the arts and all of the positive, creative, necessary activities of humankind in order to make ours a better world.

Maybe you have seen this list of blessings that circulate about this time each year:

For the teenager who is complaining about doing dishes

Because that means she is at home and not on the streets.

For the income taxes that I pay, because it means that I am employed.

For the mess to clean after a party,

Because it means that I have been surrounded by friends.

For the clothes that fit a little too snug, because it means I have enough to eat. For my shadow that watches me work, because it means I am out in the sunshine. For a lawn that needs mowing, windows that need cleaning, and gutters

that need fixing, because it means I have a home.

For all the complaining I hear about the government,

Because it means that we have freedom of speech.

For the parking spot I find at the far end of the parking lot,

Because it means I am capable of walking and that I have been blessed with transportation.

For my huge heating bill, because it means I am warm.

For the lady behind me in church who sings off key,

Because it means that I can hear.

For the pile of laundry and ironing, because it means I have clothes to wear.

For weariness and aching muscles at the end of the day,

Because it means I have been productive.

For the alarm that goes off in the early morning hours,

Because it means that I am alive.

But most of all, we are thankful to God, thankful to God who is mindful of our every need and who will see us through every dark hour. Thankful to God for life and health and opportunity and a multitude of blessings beyond our ability to count.

DEDICATION OF BANNERS FOR THE ADVENT WREATH



On the First Sunday in Advent, November 29th, we will dedicate four new blue banners to be used on our Advent Wreath. These banners are given to the Glory of God and in loving memory of Eric Bryan Bish, by his father, Pastor Kirk Bish.

Advent

"A Season of Anticipation and Preparedness"

The season of Advent is the first season of the Church Year. It became part of the Church calendar after the Festival of Christmas itself had been established. That was late in the fourth century. The celebration of the birth of Christ was not very old when the Church felt the need of a period of preparation. Originally, the Advent Season was of the same duration as Lent, forty days. The observance of Advent dates back at least to the end of the fourth century from which date there is preserved an Advent sermon preached by Bishop Maximus of Turin. Advent was mentioned specifically at the Council of Tours in the year 567. At the beginning of the seventh century the western Church limited the Season of Advent to four weeks and it has remained that way ever since.

Thus, Advent is a season of anticipation and preparedness before Christmas. The word

"Advent" means "coming" and refers to the coming of Jesus Christ. The season emphasizes a threefold coming of Christ: his coming in the flesh at Bethlehem, his coming in grace through Word and Sacrament, and his coming in glory at the day of judgment.

The season of Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas and lasts until Christmas Eve. One of the most beautiful traditions of Advent is the lighting of the Advent Wreath. The Advent Wreath is placed in the chancel area of the church. The Advent Wreath contains four blue candles. Beginning with the first Sunday of Advent, a candle is lighted each Sunday. Each Sunday then, an additional candle is

lighted so that by the Sunday preceding Christmas, all four blue candles are burning brightly.

On the first Sunday in Advent, we light the Candle of Hope. This candle symbolizes the Old Testament prophecies of the Advent, or Coming, of the Savior. On the second Sunday in Advent, we light the Candle of Love. This candle symbolizes the Coming on earth of Jesus, the Son of God, born of the Virgin Mary. On the third Sunday in Advent, we light the Candle of Joy. This candle symbolizes the Coming of the Savior into our hearts and life through faith in His holy Word. On the fourth Sunday in Advent, we light the Candle of Peace. This candle symbolizes the final Coming of the Savior in glory with all His angels for the judgment.

Then on Christmas Eve, we light the white Christ Candle. This candle symbolizes the Fulfillment of the prophecy – the Nativity of Jesus Christ, the Savior and Light of the world.

May the Season of Advent and our worship during Advent be meaningful, inspiring, and insightful so that we may properly prepare for our celebration of the "Christ-Event" on Christmas!





Time is so evasive this year. It moves so slowly and yet it just drifts away. It is part of the dilemma of coping with the pandemic and the changed behavior we have to assume. Time must adapt to the changes we make.

Our Church Year enables us to reflect upon time. On November 29th we orient ourselves to a new church year and the time which was, the time which is, and the time which is about to come. There is a hymn we sing which enables us to reflect upon time in the past, the present, and the future. Whenever we hear "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" we begin to reflect upon the time we spend "waiting" in all three of these measurements of time. Advent is a season of waiting. Waiting for just the right time when God will bring in the Day of Salvation for our entire world. Perhaps, no Advent hymn stirs in us that sense of waiting in time as "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel."

A year ago none of us had any idea as to what 2020 would bring and what lies ahead. Maybe we would love to sing *Veni Emmanuel* with a more reflective sound because we feel more like we are the ones waiting to be as the hymn sighs: "Ransom Captive, Israel," to a life beyond our control. A life only controlled by God. In our "Live Streaming" we can join along in the singing of this hymn in the safety of our homes.

John Mason Neal was the author of the hymn and married it with a Latin Plainsong, *Veni, Veni, Emmanuel*. It is a tune based on the 9th century Gregorian Mode. Modes are far more haunting than scales which bring a sense of mystery and awe to a text. For those who are interested the tune is written in the Mixolydian mode.

The hymn text, on another note, has its origins over 1,200 years ago in monastic life in the 8th or 9th century. Seven days before Christmas Eve monasteries would sing the "O antiphons" in anticipation of Christmas Eve when the eighth antiphon, "O Virgo virginum" ("O Virgin of virgins") would be sung before and after Mary's canticle, the Magnificat (Luke 1:46b-55). The Latin metrical form of the hymn was composed as early as the 12th century. Our *Evangelical Lutheran Worship* Hymn #257 "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" Veni Emmanuel outlines these for us.

December 17 "O Sophia" stanza #2 in Hymn 257 [O Wisdom]

December 18 "O Adonai" stanza #3 in Hymn 257 [O Lord of might]

December 19 "O Jesse Virgula" stanza #4 in Hymn 257 [O Branch of Jesse]


December 20 "O Davidica" stanza #5 in Hymn 257 [O Key of David]

December 21 "O Oriens" stanza #6 in Hymn 257 [O Dayspring]

December 22 "O Rex Genetium" stanza #7 in Hymn 257 [O King of Nations]

December 23 "O Emmanuel" stanza #8 in Hymn 257 [O Emmanuel]

So this Advent we wait for this virus to end so that we can assemble without fear, we wait in time for when we all can gather and sing this hymn together. And in our Waiting, O Lord waits with us. "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel."

As many of you know, I was admitted to Passavant Hospital with the coronavirus on Thursday, November 5th. I had a temperature of 101 degrees and did not feel well. At that time I was quarantined in a hospital room. The only person able to enter my room was my nurse. She would bring me my food trays, take "my vitals," give me my medications, and draw blood at 4:00 a.m. in the morning! My doctor gave me the two treatments that had been given to President Trump. My temperature quickly returned to normal as did my "vital signs."

I wish to take this opportunity to thank all of you for the kind "get well" wishes, the many telephone calls, and prayers for recovery from this coronavirus during my hospitalization. I so appreciated the many telephone calls which kept me from having only myself "to talk to"!

I was discharged from the hospital on Tuesday, November 10th. I was instructed to quarantine myself at home until November 25th. Since coming home, I am in the process of regaining my strength and dealing with an upset stomach which I believe was caused by the steroids that I had to take at home for five days by mouth. My stomach has improved some.

I also want to express my appreciation for the cards, greetings, and telephone calls since coming home. In addition, I wish to thank those members who have provided me with food – lots of food!!. All of this really means a lot to me!

I am grateful to be "on the mend"! Hopefully, I will continue to regain my strength and energy and soon be back to normal!

We express our sincere Sympathy to Kevin & Pam Hoskins on the passing of Pam's mom on Nov 16.


We also express our deepest sympathy to Ed and Carol Banks on the passing of Ed's mother, Erna Dean.
