

Known by Your Love

Through our baptism, we have become children of God and followers of Jesus Christ. As followers of Christ, Jesus gives us this commandment: "that you love one another." And he adds, "Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another."

This is a love that does not allow for the exceptions that we may be inclined to put upon it. It is indeed a difficult love to learn. But to settle for anything less is to settle for less than that to which Jesus calls us.

It emphasizes an understanding that true love goes beyond propriety. It goes beyond expectations. It knows no boundaries. It does not decide who does and who does not deserve it.

A young pastor has told the story of being honored to deliver the funeral sermon for a pastor who had died. The deceased pastor was a generation older than the young pastor and had been a mentor of sorts to him. They had lived and worked and eaten meals with one another in a church rectory for five years and thus they had been close to each other.

The young pastor shared that in all that contact he had never heard the deceased pastor speak negatively about another human being. He remembered being aware of how very rare that is. That was love. People knew that he was a disciple of Jesus even though he never had a bumper sticker on his car to that effect.

Another pastor tells about a social group that he and his wife had come to treasure. Their reason was that in all the times they had spent together, neither of them had ever heard anyone in that circle of friends put down another human being. How rare! How sad that it is so rare. These people knew how to advertise their faith and express true love. What a wonderful experience when it does happen.

Reflect on this in your own life. How often can you say that you have met such people. Even more to the point, how many could say that about us?

Those who know you - will they say that this is your trademark – that you have love for one another?

Kantor's Korner

"We have a Godly Heritage," as the psalmist says, especially when it comes to celebrating the unique heritage of Lutheran Hymnody. What sets Lutheran Hymnody apart, compared to other examples of Protestant hymnody? The answer is rooted in the Reformation itself.

Within the Protestant Reformation, there are two traditions: the Reformed and the Lutheran. There are many differences, but when it comes to examining what makes Lutheran Hymnody different than Reformed, it boils down to one issue: Do I chose Christ or does Christ Chose me? The Reform wing comes down on Personal decision, the Lutheran wing believes in trusting [key word] the promises of God, believing in his promises through faith, and accept that God "Choses" us. [John 15:12]

In some examples of "Reformed Hymnody," i.e. Baptist, Calvinistic, or American Gospel songs, a decision is required. Jesus own words in the Gospel of John say: "You did not choose me, but I choose you." It is hard to reconcile these words with the Calvinist Hymn "Once to every man and nation, comes the moment to decide," or Fanny Crosby's ELW 638 "Blessed Assurance, Jesus is Mine." Jesus Christ is far more than my personal decision to accept him as my Savior and Lord. Without question "Amazing Grace" is probably the most popular Hymn in all of our churches, but it is ironic that "Amazing Grace" does not mention the name of Christ or what He has done for us to secure this Grace freely offered.

Luther and those who picked up his mantle of "Trusting the Promises of God" hold out the idea that God acts first, we respond through Faith. Look, for example, at the words "Deck Thyself with Joy and Gladness," ELW 488 which speak about God seeking us out and inviting us to his Table of Salvation. For Luther, it is all about God. Lutheran Hymnody focuses on the promises of God and not on the decisions of men. Lutheran Hymnody is based on "Faith," much of Reformed Hymnody is based on "Works," in our decision to even make "Faith a Work" by making a decision to either choose to accept or reject Him.

I think Christians tend to be more influenced by the melody [tune] of their favorite hymn rather than the words of the hymn [text.] But texts are important because they describe the "faith we are singing about." So when we sing our favorite hymns we need to examine what the text is saying about our Faith. Are we aware of all of the riches found within the promises of God? How many promises can you remember as to what God so freely offers to us? That would be a good spiritual discipline to grow our faith. May the Holy Spirit guide your search.

- 7. We will be seeking 5 volunteers to fill council vacancies. Those whose terms have expired include Lori Coon (appointed), Kevin Hoskins, Joanne Smith, Carol Huffman and Charlie Brandt. A Nominating committee has been formed and will be reaching out to members. Please prayerfully consider being on the council and let Carol Huffman know if you are interested.
- 8. We have purchased a large print hymnal (a set of 3 books) for anyone with impaired vision. Notify Pastor if you need the large print for a worship service so the appropriate pages can be made available.
- 9. Worship and Music will study reconfiguring the sanctuary seating at the May meeting. Health guidelines have changed in the last 6 months with the current vaccination experience.

Responsibilities of the Committees

Christian Education Committee. This committee, in association with the pastor, shall oversee the conduct and promotion of the schools and the activities of all organizations within this congregation. It shall encourage the use of teaching and worship materials published or approved by the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America and seek to introduce the church's periodicals and books of family devotion into homes of congregation members. A primary aim of this committee, in cooperation with the Youth Committee, shall be to bring the call to the ministry of the Gospel and to other church vocations to the attention of qualified youth of this congregation.

Church Property Committee. This committee shall see to the proper maintenance and protection of all property of this congregation and shall take care that the same is kept in good repair. The committee shall be responsible for the cleanliness and maintenance of the church property, including the specification of job duties for custodial employees or contractors and supervision of their activities.

Christian Outreach Committee. This committee shall stimulate and lead all members of this congregation in continuous and, from time to time, concerted endeavors to reawaken the spiritually indifferent and to reach others, as yet unwon, with the Gospel and attach them to Christ's Church. To this end, the committee shall devote itself to deepening spiritual life and shall periodically study this congregation in the context of its surrounding community.

Stewardship Committee. It shall be the function of this committee to evoke and promote the expression of Christian faith in daily living, to teach the Christian use of money, to diffuse knowledge of this congregation's local national, and global ministries, and to lead all its members to higher levels of proportionate giving for the Lord's work. This committee shall also be responsible for congregational efforts which lead to informed and grateful giving, including Every Member Visits when Congregation Council directs the inclusion of such in a congregational year. This committee shall also encourage all members of this congregation to make greater use of their God-given talents in performing the Lord's work and to that end it shall conduct time and talent surveys among the membership when directed to do so by Congregation Council.

Finance Committee. This committee shall prepare a draft budget for the succeeding fiscal year . . . and it shall submit such draft budget to Congregation Council for its action and for later presentation at the Budget Meeting. The committee shall oversee all financial affairs of this congregation, making certain that they are conducted efficiently and giving particular attention to the prompt payment of all obligations and to the regular forwarding of benevolence monies to the synodical treasurer. It shall, subject to the approval of Congregation Council, be responsible for this congregation's investments and its complete insurance program. It shall be responsible for reporting the financial status of the congregation to Congregation Council at its regular monthly meeting and to the congregation's membership at the annual Budget Meeting.

Social Ministry Committee. The purpose of this committee shall be to extend Christian compassion and helpfulness to the ill, the aged, the orphaned, the poor, the imprisoned, and, in general, to persons of all ages in need of aid in body or soul. It shall strive to enlist in these efforts as many as possible of the individual members and organizations of this congregation. This committee shall further have the duty to study social conditions, primarily in the local community, in order to bring the cleansing and thoughtful light of Christian truth to bear upon critical problems through thoughtful Christian discussion of acts and issues.

Worship and Music Committee. It shall assist Congregation Council in ensuring that the services of God's house are conducted regularly and in accordance with the liturgy of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America, that competent ushers, acolytes, crucifers, lectors, and sacristans are recruited and trained, and that hymnals and other devotional materials are provided and properly maintained. This committee shall supervise the choirs of this congregation, and strive to advance their welfare and effective service. It shall arrange for the care of paraments, vestments, liturgical vessels, and musical instruments. In consultation with the organist(s) and the Director of Music, it shall furnish music supplies appropriate for use in the worship of a congregation of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

Fellowship Committee. This committee shall be responsible for arranging and scheduling fellowship and social events for members of this congregation, their families, and friends and assisting Congregation Council in other ways that promote Christian fellowship.

Youth Committee. This committee shall assist Congregation Council in overseeing activities of the youth of this congregation. The committee shall try to involve youth in activities of the church and assist them in developing and completing their own activities. This committee shall share joint responsibility with the Christian Education Committee in bringing the call of the ministry of the Gospel and to other church vocations to the attention of qualified youth of this congregation.

Communications Committee. This committee shall be responsible for providing methods and materials, such as a periodic parish newsletter, bulletin boards, calendars, press releases, etc., whereby committees and Congregation Council can inform members of this congregation and the larger community of their activities. This committee shall be responsible for maintaining the history of the congregation. The secretary and historian, when the latter exists, shall be members ex officio of this committee. Other committees, both standing and special, shall designate one of their members to serve on this committee to ensure that information on their activities is adequately presented to the congregation.

Fellowship Committee. This committee shall be responsible for arranging and scheduling fellowship and social events for members of this congregation, their families, and friends and assisting Congregation Council in other ways that promote Christian fellowship.
