Shared Life Newsletter Caring, Witnessing, Serving Nativity Lutheran Church November 2021

Later this month, families will gather together for a thanksgiving meal in gratitude for all God's blessings. The practice of giving thanks to God while sharing a meal has its origins in the Jewish Passover meal, which many scholars believe Jesus was celebrating on the evening before his crucifixion. The celebration of this sacrament clearly includes thanksgiving to God for the salvation offered to us through his Son, Jesus.

For people of the Jewish faith, the Feast of Passover celebrates the Exodus event in which the Israelites were released from their slavery to the Egyptians. This dinner also serves as a thanksgiving to God. The Old Testament provides us with many other examples of people giving thanks to God in response to God's generosity. Although there is no specific word for "thanksgiving" in Hebrew, there are examples in the Old Testament, where the Israelites praise and glorify God for God's goodness, this is especially found in the psalms. Thankfulness is found throughout the New Testament. The concept of thankfulness in the New Testament comes from the use of two Greek words. The first is charizomai, which comes from charis, "grace." The second is homologeo, "to confess, acknowledge."

So what is thankfulness? Thankfulness is an expression of our acknowledgement and appreciation of God's grace, blessings, and work in our life and the world. In our prayers, we give thanks in everything and for everything. Giving praise and thanks to God for God's many blessings is a natural part of our faith. We praise and honor God not because God needs our praise and honor, but because thanking God brings us into a deeper union with God, and reminds us of our humanity. In her book 'Help, Thanks, Wow: The Three Essential Prayers', author Anne Lamott says - "Gratitude begins in our hearts and then dovetails into behavior. It almost always makes you willing to be of service, which is where the joy resides. When you are aware of all that has been given to you, in your lifetime and the past few days, it is hard not to be humbled, and pleased to give back."

Thanksgiving to God is not so much an action as it is an attitude; it is awareness that all of life is a gift from God. Soon, we will once again gather around tables of food with our family and friends. Some of us may use that time to express gratitude to God and our loved ones for our many blessings. Yet, it is important to remember that every day of our lives is a gift from God, worthy of thanks. May we use each day gifted to us to thank God with grateful hearts and reflect God's love to the entire world.

For those looking for a prayer to use, or a guide for your own, here is a prayer as you gather with loved ones... Gracious God, we give thanks for gathering us here together. We give thanks for this food prepared by loving hands. We pray for those who go without food, family, or friendship this day. We give thanks for life, our freedom to enjoy it, and for all other blessings. Nourish this food to our bodies; give us good health and strength to love, live, and serve as you would have us. This we ask in the name of Jesus Christ our savior and Lord. Amen.

Jerusalem My Happy Home

The first Sunday in November "All Saints Sunday" pokes its head around the corner, like an old friend. November 7th seems to sit well for this year. [Remember to change your clocks since daylight savings time comes to an end]. So many gray skies in November than usual. The month brings the starkness of dark brown trees or the disbelief in seeing how dark it gets around 5:30. This Fall has been disappointing. No frosts and without frosts, no brilliant colored leaves. But this November still has a gentleness to it. Have you ever listened to a shower of falling leaves as they cascade from treetops to the ever-so-dry ground? I was in my backyard the other day. Things were just so silent, nothing but the sound of gentleness with the falling leaves. It was a very sacred moment if you will. November seems to fit moments of contemplation.

November is a melancholy month. I find myself inescapably sitting down at the piano, and playing Brahms *Intermezzi*. The music of Brahms has a certain degree of melancholia attached to it. Certainly, I never play Brahms better than in November.

The Church does something each November. It is always "All Saints Sunday" which invites us to reflect upon the saints and those who have gone before us. We are the ones who need to remember them. There is something inside of us that wants to remember, something inside of us that does not want to let go.

The Church Year has a major shift on the first Sunday in November. We move from reflecting upon Stories of Jesus and his ministry and our thoughts inescapably turn towards heaven. It's one of the few times that we stop and pause to think about this ultimate destination. We remember those who have been faithful unto death since last All Saints Sunday. My favorite hymn which speaks of this ultimate destination is "Jerusalem, My Happy Home" ELW 628. I have been known to pull out a harmonica in an attempt to accompany the choir. The tune, *Land of Rest*, is very native to Southern Folk Hymnody, although its author, Annabel Morris Buchanan, says that she first heard it at her mother's knee. The tune shows up in many folk hymn collections from Tennessee to Texas. Much has been written about the similarity of the musical intervals to the Spiritual "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot."

The lilt of the tune, the power of imagery within the words, tell us that time is short and once again we run this race which is set before us, so that we can receive the "Crown of Glory," from our Lord Jesus Christ.

So we have an idea how many to plan for, please use the signup sheet on the bulletin board across from the kitchen or on our website.




Council Notes

Here are some of the highlights from the October Congregation Council meeting. As usual, the official minutes will be approved at next month's meeting and posted on the bulletin board outside the nursery as well as our website.

- 1. Ilo Romero Lauro was able to identify and fix the issue with sanctuary speakers (a capacitor needed replaced). Additionally, the remote speakers in the fellowship room, kitchen and nursery have been fixed. There is still a noticeable hum caused by the audio wire and the power cords crossing each other behind the audio cabinet in the sanctuary.
- 2. The congregational mailbox numbers will be updated and an updated membership list will be compiled this year.
- 3. All college students have a Nativity member to support them with monthly notes and small gifts. They will also receive an exam survival kit to help them cope with finals.
- 4. In sympathy, Serenity blankets were given to the Carter, Johnson and Chantz families.
- 5. Welcome packets were updated with the current Shared Life Newsletter and given to our visitors.
- 6. Someone has expressed interest in the Administrative Assistant Position, and an interview has been held. The vote goes to council at the November meeting.
- 7. Quotes for the two sanctuary air conditioners have been requested from a third vendor.
- 8. The wall behind the church where the Girl Scout's shed was located, has been painted.
- 9. Choir rehearsals and anthems will remain on hiatus for the time being. Worship and Music will evaluate this status monthly. There are plans to have some solos during this period.


