

"ADVENT IS A SEASON OF WAITING"

Happy New Year! On Sunday, November 28, we began a new church year. We begin this new church year, year C in the lectionary, with the season of Advent. During this season, we wait for our Lord's coming, while we live now in his forgiveness. We wait in hope as we remember the beautiful promises that God in Christ has come to us in Christ's incarnation and will come again for us. Each Sunday we sing 'O Come, O Come, Emmanuel, remembering that our Emmanuel (God with us) comes down to us in love.

God continues to come to us and for us, through the person of Jesus Christ, present in the hearing of the word, and in the sacraments of Holy Baptism and Holy Communion. During Advent, we consider all of the ways in which God is present for us in and through Christ, while preparing for the day we celebrate this God who comes near to us by celebrating Jesus' birth.

As we prepare to celebrate the coming of Christ in the birth of baby Jesus, we also prepare for the second coming of Christ, where all things will be made new. We wait with hope for the day where there will be complete love, joy, and peace in the world.

There are many ways Christians may celebrate and prepare during this season of Advent. Perhaps you have your own traditions, but here are a few ideas...

We light the candles on the Advent Wreath here at Nativity on Sunday mornings during Advent as we pray and sing O Come, O Come Emmanuel. You may have your own advent wreath with candles at home, this is a great way to connect your devotional life to the worship of the Church at large. You could use a blue table cloth to fit with the color of the season. You may read scripture and/or say a prayer as you light the candles on the wreath each day or once a week. We have an Advent Star Devotional available, from United Lutheran Seminary, that would work great for this practice.

It's fun to use an *Advent Calendar*, with or without daily chocolates, to count down the days. In the season and spirit of giving, you may follow a *Reverse Advent Calendar*. This calendar gives daily suggestions of non-perishable food items, which you may bring to the church to donate to NHCO. Both of these calendars, as well as the advent devotionals, are available in the Narthex.

If you are interested in using the Advent devotionals or the Advent calendars available, but are unable to make it to the church to pick one up, let us know. You may email or call the office, and we will make sure that you get the resources you'd like.

In whatever way you prepare to celebrate our Lord's birth this advent season, I pray that it is filled with great meaning that leads you to trust God's love and forgiveness that has come through Christ Jesus our Lord.

BANNERS AND CANDLES ON THE ADVENT WREATH





On the first Sunday in Advent, we light the **Candle of Hope**. This candle symbolizes the Old Testament prophecies of the Advent, or Coming, of the Savior.

On the second Sunday in Advent, we light the **Candle of Love.** This candle symbolizes the Coming on earth of Jesus, the Son of God, born of the Virgin Mary.

On the third Sunday in Advent, we light the **Candle of Joy**. This candle symbolizes the Coming of the Savior into our hearts and life through faith in His holy Word.

On the fourth Sunday in Advent, we light the **Candle of Peace**. This candle symbolizes the final Coming of the Savior in glory with all His angels for the judgment.

Then on Christmas Eve, we light the white Christ Candle. This candle symbolizes the Fulfillment of the prophecy – the Nativity of Jesus Christ, the Savior and Light of the world.

Kantor's Korner

People love to sing Christmas Carols. Maybe it's because they probably know the first stanza of the words. Maybe it is because we have sung them from our early years in Sunday School or even way back then, yes, public schools. How many of us have enjoyed singing them while gathered around a piano at past Christmas parties. I sure miss these moments.

As a musical form Carols have always been popular because they emerge from the common folk. They were often first sung during harvests in fields before they made their way to be sung in church. It is interesting to note that Carols are universal. They come from many different countries.

Early Carols often had Latin words attached like *Adeste Fidelis* ELW 283 "O Come all ye faithful," or In *Dulci Jubilo* ELW 288 "Good Christian Friends, Rejoice," or *Veni, Veni, Emmanuel* ELW 257 " O Come, O Come Emmanuel," or *Divine Mysterium* ELW 295 "Of the Father's Love Begotten." The First collection of carols came from *Piae Cantiones*, a collection of late Medieval Latin songs which was first published in 1582. In subsequent years carols became all the more popular when music publishers promoted them in the 19th Century.

By the time of the Reformation carols emerged in the vernacular to convey the Evangelical Faith. Martin Luther, of course, authored many. One of his more favorites is *Vom Himmel Hoch* ELW 268 "From Heaven Above to Earth I Come." He wrote it to teach the miracle of the Incarnation to his 6 children. There is still a child-like simplicity to the Carol.

By the 20th Century more collections appeared as the more popular ones, *Mendelssohn* ELW 270 "Hark the Herald Angels Sing," *The First Nowell* ELW 300 "The First Noel" or *Carol* ELW 282 "It Came Upon the Midnight Clear," appeared. The publication in 1871 of *Christmas Carols, New and O*ld by Henry Ramsden Bramley and Sir John Stainer was a significant contribution to a revival of carols in Victorian Britain.

The Oxford Book of Carols, first published in 1928 by Oxford University Press, was a notably successful collection; edited by the British composers' Martin Shaw and Ralph Vaughan Williams, along with clergyman and author Percy Dearmer. It became a widely used source of carols in among choirs and church congregations in Britain and remains in print today. If you have ever come across "A Service of Lessons and Carols," from King's College, Cambridge, many of these carols included within the service come from *The Oxford Book of Carols*. The service first broadcasted by the BBC was brought forth by the Dean of the Chapel who felt that the "Hope of Christmas" needed to be proclaimed in light of the mass devastation and death caused by the First World War. The Service is still broadcast today to over 370 million people throughout the world. It is part of the Public Broadcasting System [PBS] and airs on WQED at 10:00 a.m. Christmas Eve Morning, and again at 7:00 p.m. later that evening. I record it every year. I think this will be my 46th year!
