Kantor's Korner

On December 10, 2021, I watched Senator Bob Dole's Funeral Service at the National Cathedral in Washington. I was most happy to hear the Gathering Hymn, "Lift High the Cross." I don't know if it was chosen by him but if you live for 98 years, you have a lot of time to plan your own funeral.

This hymn has been a favorite of mine. So much so that back in 1976 I submitted this hymn to the "Hymn Text" commission as well as the "Hymn Tune" commission of the Lutheran Book of Worship. In my seminary days, I once found it in an Anglican Hymnal, Hymns Ancient and Modern. I was so impressed with it that I was on a mission to have it included in the new Lutheran Book of Worship, so I submitted it for inclusion. I like to tease my fellow pastors by saying "it was my greatest contribution to American Lutheranism."

In recent times it seems to have become a popular hymn in both Lutheran and Episcopal Churches. So, to say the least, I was overjoyed to hear it sung at Senator Bob Dole's funeral, for he was a man whom I admired. I am uncertain as to why the hymn was chosen. Maybe it was the words of the third stanza.

### All new born soldiers of the crucified

### Bear on their brows the seal of him who died.

Down through the years I have written many sermons comparing those who serve in the military and those who serve in the Church. There is something each group has in common. Both of them are held together by one word: SACRIFICE. It is the ability to be willing to give up who we are to attain the greater good. It is innate in the very words of Christian discipleship. "We must lose our lives in order to find them."

About a week before the funeral, I saw an earlier TV interview between Lester Holt and Bob Dole. Lester asked him: "Of all the things you have accomplished how would you like to be remembered?" Bob Dole's answer was so representative as to whom he was: "that I was a Veteran." Remembering his work in Civil Rights, his legislation for the inclusion of the disabled, his determination for the creation of a "Martin Luther King, Jr." Holiday, I found his answer reflective of a man who exuded humility. On Saturdays he would often be found at the World War II Memorial thanking other veterans for their service.

May the third stanza of "Lift High the Cross,"

All new born soldiers of the crucified

Bear on their brows the seal of him who died.

also remind us of our Baptism and join those who have gone before us in proclaiming the sacrifice of God's own Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.
