From the Pastor's heart...

There's a popular story about two children playing together while a movie about Jesus' life was on television. One of the children was Christian; the other was not. When the movie got to Jesus' crucifixion, the second child became more interested in what was happening and stopped playing. The other child, was frustrated that the other stopped playing, and reassured the other "Never mind about that! He gets out of it in the end!"

I think at times, this is our attitude towards Easter. It's tempting for us to fast forward through the suffering and death of Jesus right to the happy ending of his resurrection. We long for happy endings in our broken world.

During that final week, the last thing that the disciples expected was a happy ending. We know from the gospels that Jesus told the disciples three times that he must suffer and die, and that he would rise again on the third day, but the disciples didn't understand him. They couldn't believe it; what they understood about death, was that it was final.

The first time Jesus spoke about his upcoming death and resurrection, Peter talked back, rejecting his words. The disciples ran away when Jesus was arrested. John's gospel account tells us that the disciples hid away together in fear after the death and burial of Jesus. Mark tells us that the women who found an empty tomb where Jesus was supposed to be didn't tell anyone because they were afraid. Luke's account tells us that the women told the other disciples, but they didn't believe them. The disciples witnessed the real, slow, painful, and shameful crucifixion of their friend and teacher. They were convinced, that this was it, this was the end. They couldn't imagine that death would not have the last word.

We of course know that was not the end of the story. We know that's when everything changed. Jesus was raised from the dead. Easter is commonly referred to as the Resurrection of our Lord, reminding us of the deep and loving power of God that saves. The same God that created the world out of nothing, also created new life on the other side of death. Easter isn't simply celebrated that Jesus go out of it at the end. We celebrate that Jesus saw things through to the end; he experienced the cross, death, the grave, and God raised him up to new life.

In our creeds and confessions, we boldly proclaim that Jesus was crucified, died and was buried, and on the third day he rose again. Jesus' mortality reminds us of our own. Without death there can be no resurrection. Through Christ's death we are reminded that death does not have the final word and that nothing can separate us from the love of God through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Blessings to you as we come to the end of our Lenten journey with Christ, towards the cross; as we remember the hope, love, and promises of salvation we are given in his death and resurrection. Blessings, Pastor Jennifer Soltis

Do you not know that all of us who have been baptized into Christ Jesus were baptized into his death? Therefore, we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his. (Romans 8:3-5)

Remembering Carol

It is an amazing gift to write a hymn: to return to the Lord what he has first given to us. There have been a variety of Christians who authored an infinite number of them. The authors have come from numerous vocations: many were pastors, some theologians, some in Holy Monastic orders or Evangelists; others were simply lay people

intent on expressing their gratitude to God. Carol Zigler Kusserow was in this last category of vocations. She was a music teacher.

In a way all of those mentioned above would say that the words, and maybe even the music, just came to them. It perhaps is one of the best expressions of Faith, to write a hymn. What we need to give back to God, he has already given to us. He creates the very faith we need to express the love of him to our inner soul. I am reminded of the Black spiritual: "When the Spirit says sing I just gotta sing." It was that way for Carol.

What is highly unusual was that no one knows if Carol wrote the hymn far earlier in her life or in the twilight of her years. The hymn was just recently discovered by her surviving husband, Pastor Ralph Kusserow. Carol was born into Eternal Life on February 23⁻ of this year.

The text of her hymn is unique. It centers on her desire for a grateful heart and seeks God's help to make a witness to others. It reflects her Personal Mission Statement which sees her being shaped into the character of God's own Son, so that others may see the God she worships. The hymn, I am sure, was deeply influenced in her formative years since Carol was a daughter of missionary parents to India and brought to fruition in marrying a Lutheran Pastor, Ralph Kusserow, both of whom proclaimed the Gospel as missionaries in Malaysia, Singapore, and Tanzania.

Looking more closely at the tune, which as a musician she composed, there are some musical surprises. Her musical suspensions, her choice of secondary dominants, her use of diminished and augmented chords reflect her musical sophistication. All of these along with a very simple melodic line make the hymn unique. However, there is no Hymn Tune that has been designated I will communicate with Ralph, Carol's husband, and inquire if he would like to give the tune a name in her honor. We at Nativity were fortunate to have both Carol and Ralph be part of us before they began their new chapter in Zelienople. Our lives and ministry have been enriched because of the both of them.




